NJ Amistad Commission's Exemplary Lessons Award

The Award committee selects **two teachers** to receive the Amistad Commission's Exemplary Award: One teacher representing Grades K-8 and one teacher representing Grades 9-12.

Each award recipient receives \$2,500 in recognition of his or her extraordinary contributions. Additionally, the recipient's school district will receive \$,2,500.

The Exemplary Lesson Criteria:

The lesson must include a list of all materials, resources, media, and technology used to create the lesson. Student projects should be included.

The lesson must identify the grade level, period in America History, and NJSLS The lesson must be videoed and be no longer than 45 minutes.

Any students that can be visible in the video, MUST HAVE A district waiver for them to appear on a district/state website.

A written copy of the lesson plan, describing the time breakdown of each activity, (anticipatory, practice, assessment, and follow-up) activities.

The lesson must be approved by the school administrator and documentation must be provided.

Each Approved Exemplary Lesson will receive a \$300 award for use of their lesson. The submission of the lesson must be submitted before April 1, 2024.

Teaching Your Students About the Presidential Elections for President's Day Challenging Questions on the 12, 20, 22, 25th Amendments

Does the 12th Amendment allow the possibility of a President and Vice President from different parties being elected if no one receives 270 Electoral votes because of damaged or challenged votes that cannot be certified?

Does the 20th Amendment clearly define who would become president if the President-elect died, became incapacitated, or does not qualify to become President on January 20?


Does the 22nd Amendment preclude a president who has served two terms from being elected Vice-President or Speaker of the House of Representatives?

Does the 25th Amendment provide for an orderly plan if both the President and Vice-president became incapacitated at the same time? Would this be challenged if the Speaker of the House was from a different political party than the elected president and vice-president?

Talking About the Chronological Age of World Leaders

Most global leaders are in their 50s and 60s

The framers of our constitution required a president to be 35 years of age or older. In 1800, the life expectancy of a person in the United States was age 40. Today the global average life expectancy is age 70 and in the United States it is estimated at age 79. George Washington was elected president at age 57 and he retired at age 65. John Adams was elected at age 61. The average age of the delegates to the Constitutional Convention was age 42 with 14 delegates over the age of 50, (Roger Sherman was age 66 and Ben Franklin was age 81.)

Our oldest presidents are:

Joseph Biden, elected at age 78. Donald Trump, elected at age 70.

Ronald Reagan, elected at age 69 and retired at age 77. He lived to age 93. William Henry Harrison, elected at age 68 years and passed 54 days later. James Buchanan, elected at age 65 and retired at age 69. He lived to age 77. George H. W. Bush, elected at age 64 and retired at age 68. He lived to age 94. Zachary Taylor, elected at age 64 and passed at age 65.

Dwight D. Eisenhower, elected at age 62 and retired at age 70. He lived to age 78. Andrew Jackson, elected at age 61 and retired at age 69. He lived to age 78. John Adams, elected at age 61 and retired at age 65. He lived to age 90. Gerald Ford, elected at age 61 and retired at age 63. He lived top age 93. Harry S. Truman, elected at age 60 and retired at age 68. He lived to age 88.



Student teams will be able to submit their work into the annual Eco Diary competition.


