NJ Amistad Commission's Exemplary Lessons Award

The Award committee selects **two teachers** to receive the Amistad Commission's Exemplary Award: One teacher representing Grades K-8 and one teacher representing Grades 9-12.

Each award recipient receives \$2,500 in recognition of his or her extraordinary contributions. Additionally, the recipient's school district will receive \$,2,500.

The Exemplary Lesson Criteria:

The lesson must include a list of all materials, resources, media, and technology used to create the lesson. Student projects should be included. The lesson must identify the grade level, period in America History, and NJSLS The lesson must be videoed and be no longer than 45 minutes. Any students that can be visible in the video, MUST HAVE A district waiver for them to appear on a district/state website. A written copy of the lesson plan, describing the time breakdown of each activity, (anticipatory, practice, assessment, and follow-up) activities. The lesson must be approved by the school administrator and documentation must be provided. Each Approved Exemplary Lesson will receive a \$300 award for use of their lesson. The submission of

the lesson must be submitted before April 1, 2024.

What might happen if a presidential candidate died between Election Day and the Third Wednesday in December?

Republican Ulysses S. Grant was reelected president in 1872, defeating challenger Horace Greeley, the founder and editor of the New York Tribune. Greely ran as the candidate of the Democratic Party and the Liberal Republican Party. Horace Greeley died on November 29, 1872, which was after the presidential election but before the Electoral College cast its votes. During a joint session of Congress on February 12, 1873, Greeley's electoral votes were divided between the following candidates: Thomas A. Hendricks (42 votes), Benjamin G. Brown (18 votes), Charles J. Jenkins (2 votes), and David Davis (1 vote)

The Power of the Political Party to Select their Candidate: The 1972 Election

After the 1972 convention, revelations came out that George McGovern's (D) running mate Sen. Tom Eagleton, had been treated for mental illness. Eagleton was forced to resign from the ticket and McGovern chose Sargent Shriver as his replacement. But McGovern did not have the authority to select his running mate. On August 9, 1972, the Democratic National Committee met again to officially nominate Shriver as McGovern's running mate.

The Importance of States in Electing the President and Vice-President

The people vote for electors who represent the candidate of a political party. They meet on the third Wednesday in December (12/18/24). Some states have laws binding electors to vote for the winner of the election in their state, others do not. If the winner of the convention dies or is incapacitated, it is likely that the state legislatures would quickly meet to amend the law to allow them to vote for the candidate of their choice. These six weeks between Election day and when the Electoral College meets would establish an historic precedent.


In Washington State in 2016, three so-called "faithless" electors voted for Colin Powell instead of Hillary Clinton, violating a pledge under state law to vote for the candidate who won the most votes in their state. The state fined them for their defiance.

In Colorado, a Democratic elector violated his pledge to vote for Clinton, the candidate chosen by the voters in that state. Colorado's secretary of state removed the elector from his post and replaced him with someone who proceeded to vote for Clinton but the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit ruled against the secretary of state. (Brennan Center for Justice)

The Importance of the 20th Amendment

If the president-elect dies or is incapacitated after the Electoral College meets, the vice president is inaugurated. Section 3 of the 20th Amendment reads:

"If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President."





Channy Chhi Laux, Cambodian Genocide survivor & author of Short Hair Detention

When the Khmer Rouge seized Cambodia in 1975, Channy Chhi Laux was thirteen years old. For the next four years she endured starvation, forced labor, disease, and tremendous loss. In June 1979, she arrived in Lincoln, Nebraska as a Cambodian refugee and enrolled at Lincoln High School. Despite speaking no English and having not attended school for four years, she managed to achieve academic success. She went on to earn a Master of Science in Applied Mathematics from Santa Clara University and undergraduate degrees from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She then spent 30 years working in Silicon Valley as an engineer in the Aerospace and Biotech industries. She is now an award-winning author and chef.
