NJ Amistad Commission's Exemplary Lessons Award

The Award committee selects **two teachers** to receive the Amistad Commission's Exemplary Award: One teacher representing Grades K-8 and one teacher representing Grades 9-12.

Each award recipient receives \$2,500 in recognition of his or her extraordinary contributions. Additionally, the recipient's school district will receive \$,2,500.

The Exemplary Lesson Criteria:

- The lesson must include a list of all materials, resources, media, and technology used to create the lesson. Student projects should be included.
 - The lesson must identify the grade level, period in America History, and NJSLS
 - The lesson must be videoed and be no longer than 45 minutes.
- Any students that can be visible in the video, MUST HAVE A district waiver for them to appear on a district/state website.
 - A written copy of the lesson plan, describing the time breakdown of each activity, (anticipatory, practice, assessment, and follow-up) activities.
- The lesson must be approved by the school administrator and documentation must be provided.

Each Approved Exemplary Lesson will receive a \$300 award for use of their lesson. The submission of the lesson must be submitted before April 1, 2024.

The Amistad Commission's New Jersey History Day Contest

The Amistad Commission is in the process of creating a social studies contest on African American History in New Jersey. We are seeking educators with **experience in elementary education**, **specifically a background in fourth and fifth grade social studies**. We also will welcome other educators, mainly those with National History Day experience, and those with technology, science, art, English and History expertise. The goal of this committee will be to create a one-day contest, on New Jersey's local History, that will highlight the contributions of African Americans. The contest will be limited to 50 student projects this year.

Duties of the Amistad Commission's History Day Committee:

Committee members will serve a one-year term, minimally.

One person will serve as the chair for the committee, for one year.

Groups will meet virtually bimonthly to discuss model for a one-day contest to be held in February of 2024.

The committee with be responsible for creating the framework on the one-day contest, scoring rubrics and questions for the participants on their projects.

Committee Chair or designees will present at the Amistad Summer Curriculum Institute
Committee members will be expected to attend the contest and serve as coordinators or judges
Each member of the History Day Committee will receive \$1,000 for a year of service (July 1 to June 30, 2024.)

RevolutionNJ is implementing a History Happened Here Local History project for students grades 5 to 12

Deadline: December 8, 2023

During the 2024-2025 school year, six educators will be running a trial version of the program in their classes, using materials provided by RevolutionNJ to help their students navigate the research process. The selected educators will receive a stipend of \$1,500 to participate in the trial.

Requirements include attending a one-hour virtual training, assigning the project to at least one class (or club), teaching provided modules on research practices, sharing exemplar projects, administering a student survey, and attending an online debriefing. 

Kean's 16th Annual Human Rights Conference Spreads Nelson Mandela's Message

Ndaba Mandela, the grandson of former South Africa president and human rights icon Nelson Mandela, will lead a list of internationally renowned speakers headlining the Kean University Human Rights Conference on Friday, December 8.

The conference – organized by the Human Rights Institute (HRI) at Kean – this year marks the 75th anniversary of the passage of the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, with the theme *Freedom, Equity and Justice for All.*

The Human Rights Conference will be held from 9 a.m. to noon on December 8 at Wilkins Theatre on Kean's Union campus. The event is free and open to the public, but attendees must **register online**.

Joining Mandela as speakers will be Sophia Kianni, an Iranian-American climate change activist and the youngest appointed United Nations advisor, and John Prendergast, a New York Times best-selling author and co-founder, with actor George Clooney, of the human rights organization The Sentry.

Kianni is a student at Stanford University and founder of Climate Cardinals, an international nonprofit that translates climate information into more than 100 languages.

Prendergast's organization, The Sentry, is an investigative and policy team that follows the dirty money connected to war criminals and transnational war profiteers. He has worked for the White House, the State Department, the National Intelligence Council, and held other posts. He is also a former Anne Evans Estabrook Human Rights Senior Fellow at Kean.

Felice Vazquez, senior vice president of planning and special counsel to the president at Kean, said past HRI conferences have explored issues such as disability justice, food insecurity, and the importance of voting.

"The Human Rights Conference is an important event at Kean each year, and helps the University expand its reach and spread its message of freedom and unity," Raue said. "We are excited to bring these speakers to the Kean community and to recognize human rights leadership."

The conference coincides with the last day of the exhibition *WE DECLARE* at Kean's Human Rights Gallery. A large-scale mural created by Kean alumnus and Artist-in-Residence Ricardo Roig this semester, it features many well-known global human rights activists and honors the 75th anniversary of the U.N. declaration.


