100 Years Ago (1924)

Greece Became an Independent Republic

Greek politics, particularly between the two World Wars, involved a struggle for power between monarchists and republicans. Greece was proclaimed a republic in 1924, but George II returned to the throne in 1935, and a plebiscite in 1946 upheld the monarchy. It was finally abolished, however, by referendum on December 8, 1974, when more than two-thirds of the voters supported the establishment of a republic. Source

200 Years Ago (1824) Election of 1824

The presidential election of 1824 represents a watershed in American politics. The collapse of the Federalist Party and the illness of the "official candidate" of the Democratic-Republicans led to a slate of candidates who were all Democratic-Republicans. This led to the end of the Congressional Caucus system for nominating candidates, and eventually, the development of a new two-party system in the United States. In the election, Andrew Jackson won a plurality of both the popular and electoral vote. But John Quincy Adams became president. Four crucial elements of our election system were highlighted in the election of 1824: the nomination of candidates, the popular election of electors, the Electoral College, and the election of the president in the House when no candidate receives a majority in the Electoral College. 300 Years Ago (1724)

Pragmatic Sanction becomes State Law

The Pragmatic Sanction stipulated the indivisibility of the Habsburg domains as well as the right of primogeniture of the male or female line (as Charles himself remained without a male heir). During Charles VI's lifetime, the European powers had promised to guarantee this rule, but after his death, his daughter Maria Theresa was forced to defend her claim to the Austrian throne against the competing claims of the electors of Saxony and Bavaria.

400 Years Ago (1624)

Fort Amsterdam was constructed by the Dutch in Manhattan

In 1624, 30 families were sponsored by Dutch West India Company moving from Nut Island to Manhattan Island, where Fort Amsterdam was being built. The Mohawk-Mahican War in the Hudson Valley led the company to relocate even more settlers to the vicinity of the new Fort Amsterdam. The fort also served as the center of trading activity. It contained a barracks, the church, a house for the West India Company director and a warehouse for the storage of company goods. The Seal of New York City recognizes 1625 for its founding. Source

500 Years Ago (1524)

Peasants Revolt in Germany

Thomas Müntzer, Florian Geyer, and Hans Muller organized a revolt against what they saw as unchristian and inequitable policies of the Church and nobles. The peasants were poorly armed, lacked experienced leadership, and were not united. It is estimated that 100,000 German peasants were killed in the conflict, including Müntzer, Geyer, and Muller with hundreds of thousands more dying from starvation after the destruction of farmlands.

NJ Amistad Commission's Exemplary Lessons Award

The Award committee selects **two teachers** to receive the Amistad Commission's Exemplary Award: One teacher representing Grades K-8 and one teacher representing Grades 9-12.

Each award recipient receives \$2,500 in recognition of his or her extraordinary contributions. Additionally, the recipient's school district will receive \$,2,500.

The Exemplary Lesson Criteria:

The lesson must include a list of all materials, resources, media, and technology used to create the lesson. Student projects should be included.

The lesson must identify the grade level, period in America History, and NJSLS The lesson must be videoed and be no longer than 45 minutes.

Any students that can be visible in the video, MUST HAVE A district waiver for them to appear on a district/state website.

A written copy of the lesson plan, describing the time breakdown of each activity, (anticipatory, practice, assessment, and follow-up) activities.

The lesson must be approved by the school administrator and documentation must be provided.

Each Approved Exemplary Lesson will receive a \$300 award for use of their lesson. The submission of the lesson must be submitted before April 1, 2024.


