Extreme Weather in New Jersey

From 1980–2024 (as of May 8, 2024), there have been 67 confirmed weather/climate disaster events with losses exceeding \$1 billion each to affect New Jersey. These events included 6 drought events, 4 flooding events, 1 freeze event, 27 severe storm events, 12 tropical cyclone events, and 17 winter storm events. The 1980–2023 annual average is 1.5 events (CPI-adjusted); the annual average for the most recent 5 years (2019–2023) is 3.6 events (CPI-adjusted). Source




Remembering the 'Freedom Summer' of 1964



Developing Culturally Responsive Lesson Plans on AAPI History

Teach Asian American Stories is launching the AAPI Lesson Plan Development Workshop

July 9-10, 2024 at Montclair State University.

This is a 2-day workshop for K-12 educators in New Jersey to engage in intensive lesson plan development on Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) histories. Participating educators will gain knowledge on AAPI histories, professional development on teaching AAPI histories and lesson plan design, resources catered to their classroom grade levels, and guided focus groups with support from curriculum experts and facilitators. By the end of the workshop, participating educators will have completed a draft at least one lesson plan for their classrooms, which will then be reviewed and edited. Finalized lesson plans will be returned to educators by August 31, 2024 to implement in the school year and then published online for free public access.

Teachers will receive a stipend of up to \$325 and Professional Development Hours.

Course Descriptions

Teaching the Holocaust- EMSE5342(FALL,3 Credits) This course is designed to prepare K-12 teachers to teach the Holocaust and Holocaust-related themes in accordance with N.J.S.A. 18A:-1 et seq. University instructors will teach students pedagogy for teaching historic information. Using various texts and media, students will explore teaching strategies, course content, and curricular materials that meet age-appropriate learning objectives. Instructors will also teach strategies for reading complex historic text and creating evidence-based writing samples in accordance with the Common Core of State Standards.

Teaching Prejudice Reduction- EMSE 5343 (SPRING,3 Credits) Students will develop strategies for teaching prejudice reduction by examining topics such as race, ethnicity, discrimination, bullying, and preconception. University instructors will emphasize approaches that will reduce the role of prejudice in their students' lives to prepare them for 21st century life and careers. Students will learn methods of incorporating prejudice reduction into daily instruction and curriculum development.


